In response to a demand for legal texts in Braille for blind lawyers and law students, the Library of Congress, through its project, Books for the Adult Blind, has caused to be embossed in Braille thirteen important legal works. Copies of these have been placed in ten libraries throughout the country—one for each federal judicial circuit. From these libraries they may be borrowed by any blind reader.
