OUR MAN IN HUTCHINS: The Honors Banquet for this year has been announced for April 19 at the Michigan Union. Admission is by invitation only. Recipients of recognition include those elected to Order of the Coif, senior editors of the Law Review, and winners of other academic awards and prizes. . . Second round of Campbell Competition will take place March 9 and 10 with the finals on April 12. Distinguished justices on the final round court will include: Justice Potter Stewart, U.S. Supreme Court; Chief Judge Wilber Miller, District of Columbia; District Judge Theodore Levin, Eastern District of Michigan; Dean Allan Smith; and Professor Paul Kauper.

COOK LECTURES IN TWO WEEKS: Dean Smith has announced the selection of Luther Gulick, president of the Institute of Public Administration, New York City, as speaker for the William W. Cook Lectures this year, Monday through Friday, March 6 - 10. Mr. Gulick's topic for the series will be "The Metropolitan Problem and American Governmental Policy." Titles for the individual talks will be: "Significance of the Metropolitan Problem," Monday, March 6; "American Ideas and Experience with Local Government," Tuesday, March 7; "Underlying Theory," Wednesday and Thursday, March 8-9; and "Action Program," Friday, March 10.

Mr. Gulick received his bachelor's and master's degrees at Oberlin College, and his doctor of philosophy degree from Columbia University. Prior to his appointment as president of the IPA, Mr. Gulick served as city administrator for New York City from 1954 to 1956. He is the author of several books, including "Administrative Reflections, World War II," "Modern Management for the City of New York," and "METRO: Changing Problems and Lines of Attack."

Discussing the theme of the Cook series, he states: "We are now faced by a revolutionary change in the pattern of human settlement, dramatized by the rise of extensive metropolitan areas. This development has created a series of interrelated discomforts, diseconomies, and difficulties. "When we turn to our governments to help us do something effective about these problems, we find the established system and the standard approaches are unequal to the task." The U-M's Legislative Research Center is currently publishing a series of 10 reports dealing with various legal facets of this problem.

This is the 10th series of Cook lectures. They are made possible by the William W. Cook endowment fund and are published in book form following delivery. This year the lectures will be held at 4:15 p.m. daily in Rackham Lecture Hall.

PLACEMENT MEETING for '62 graduates was held Thursday with Miss Bliss and Prof. James. Students were urged to complete Placement Information Cards as soon as possible. Last year there were 91 firms interviewing here at school and 342 job opportunities. Among the 243 graduates last year, 36 are working in Michigan, 17 Illinois, 15 in Ohio, New York and Washington, D.C. and 13 in California.
