OUR MAN IN HUTCHINS: Big city government standards may decline if the flight of middle-class families to suburbia continues, President Luther Gulick of the Institute of Public Administration, New York, said Wednesday (March 8) at The University of Michigan, delivering the third of five William W. Cook lectures on American institutions.

"Local incompetence may lead to the assumption by the states of many activities which otherwise might have been assigned to the metropolitan areas. This tendency will no doubt be strengthened by the desire to handle matters by the state political machines, and the fact that there are no countervailing 'metropolitan' political machines and no local 'metropolitan' leaderships....

"It may well be, as Andrew Hacker suggested, that our new and expanded middle class is renouncing politics and leaving us with a vacuum of political leadership, inherently undemocratic corporate involvement in politics, and a substitution of impersonal for personal politics, especially at the local level." "Perhaps the acceptability of broader metropolitan institutions will now depend on the ideas and devices which can be evolved or invented for the preservation of legitimate local interests more than any other single factor," he concluded. "At present, the bulk of city people are quite satisfied to be passengers on the ship of democracy, letting others bother themselves about stoking the fires and swabbing down the decks."

This Sunday after the noon meal Prof. Wilfred Malenbaum will discuss the topic "Socialist and Capitalist Economic Systems". Prof. Malenbaum is a professor of economics at the University of Pennsylvania. On Wednesday, March 15, Prof. L. Hart Wright will discuss the topic, "Conservative and Liberal Economics; A Layman's Appraisal"; Prof. Wright will speak at 6:30 in the Lounge. On the following evening Thursday, March 16, Mr. Bernard Bechoefer will discuss the topic of "Negotiating with the Russians on Disarmament"; Mr. Bechoefer joined the State Dept. in 1942 and rose to the position of Officer in charge of International Security Affairs which deals principally with armaments control. He was a member of the U.S. Delegation to the Disarmament Negotiations in London and New York. Mr. Bechoefer is now in private practice in Washington, D.C. On Sunday, March 19, Prof. Samuel Shapiro will discuss the topic "The Ideological Struggle"; Prof. Shapiro is a Prof. of History at the U. of California, Berkeley. On Friday evening, March 24, Senator Bourke Hickenlooper of Iowa and Mr. Lyman Tondall, Wall Street lawyer, will discuss the Connally Reservation. This discussion should prove very interesting especially since Sen. Hickenlooper was one of the principal proponents of the Connally Reservation in the senate. All are invited; bring your dates; The discussion will begin at 6:30 in the lounge. Other speakers expected in the near future are Russell Kirk of Columbia University Owen Lattimore and Sen. Lausche of Ohio.

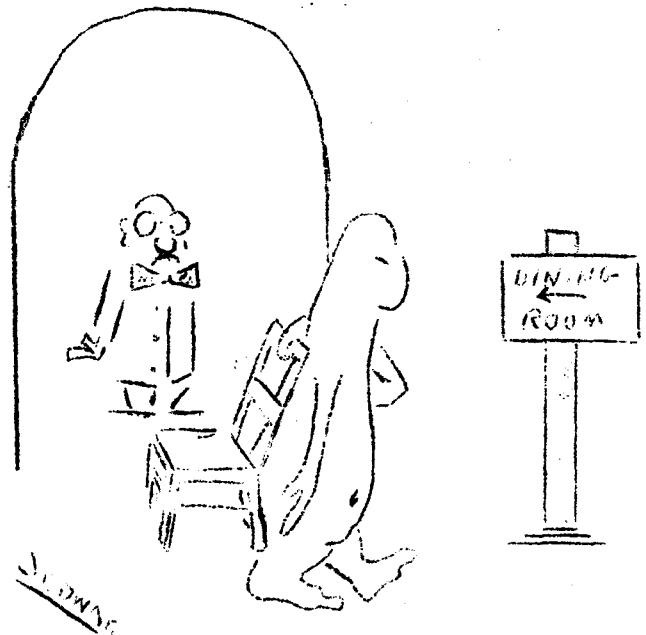
