OUR MAN IN HUTCHINS: The debate over the Connally Amendment with Senator Bourke Hickenlooper of Iowa and Mr. Lyman Tondall will be held in the Law Club Lounge immediately following dinner tonight. . . . A law school student and alumnus have won awards in the 1960 Broomfield essay prize competition of the U-M Law School. This year's essay topic was "Public Regulation of Private Discrimination Based on Race." First prize of \$700 was won by Theodore J. St. Antoine, a 1954 Law School graduate now associated with the law offices of J. Albert Woll, general counsel for A.F.L.-C.I.O., Washington, D.C. (736 Bowen Building). St. Antoine was Editor-in-Chief of the Michigan Law Review and on the winning team of the Campbell Competition his junior year. William C. Griffith, a Law School senior won second prize of \$500. The essay contest is supported through funds given the University by the late Archibald Broomfield ('02 law).

THE LAW SCHOOL To fill the generally recognized gap in present student-faculty relations Jim Adler, Editor-in-Chief of Law Review, Phil Burt, Presiding Judge of Case Clubs and Dave Lurie, President of the SBA have appointed the members of this year's Student Faculty Liaison Committee. They are Bob Wesseling, Chairman, Tim Scanlon, John Peschel, Stu Shanor, Dave Weinman, Jim Schiller, Bob Turkhorn, John Borgard and Dave Dykhouse. The Committee will seek the student's opinion as to whether the school and its opportunities conform to his own ideals concerning an institution of this caliber. In studying various aspects of the Law School life, it will submit reports for action to both Dean Smith and the appropriate student organization. You are urged to contact any of the above members regarding views or suggestions.

CREASE BALL: ALL THE FACULTY WILL BE THERE. WILL YOU BE THERE TO SEE THEM IN ACTION? The annual CREASE BALL will be held this year on April 29th in the Lawyers Club from 9:30 to 12:30. Music will be by Johnny Harberd and his band. For those freshmen who don't already know, the CREASE BALL is the Law School's only big social event of the year. Unfortunately, this year it falls on the same weekend as the undergraduate Spring Weekend. So, unless you want to be aced out by some immature undergrad, it is not too early to begin making plans for CREASE BALL on April 29th. Tickets will be sold on the first floor of Hutchins Hall and will also be available from members of Barristers. As in the past, the purchase of a ticket will enable you to have the Ann Arbor police force serve a summons on your date or spouse ordering her to appear at the Ball.

AMERICAN INVESTMENT: The U-M has published a two volume study designed primarily for companies considering entry into the European market titled American Enterprise in the European Common Market: A Legal Profile. It is authored by 11 scholars and practitioners on both sides of the Atlantic, including Prof. Stein, Prof. Conard, Prof. L. Hart Wright and Instructor Peter Hay.

Discussing American investment in European countries, the work points out that today, American investment amounts to less than 2% of the national income of Italy, France, West Germany and Belgium vis-a-vis 35% of Canada's. Noting possible conflicts between the "Inner Six" and "Outer Seven", it is feared this could undermine Western political unity and increase discrimination against U.S. goods. The countries of the Warsaw Pact, led by U.S.S.R., have also undertaken market integration.

Financial support for the project came from the Ford Foundation and the William W. Cook Endowment for legal research.

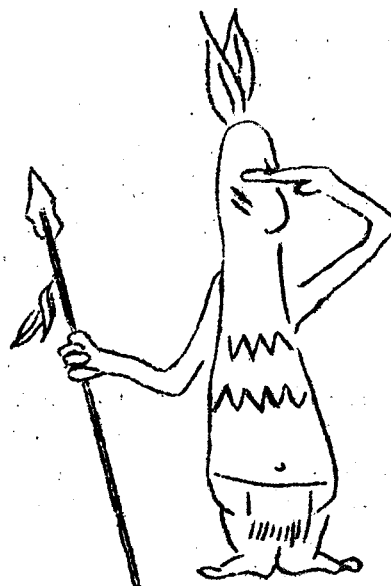
