HONORS BANQUET. Announcement of the 1960-61 staff of the Michigan Law Review and the award of academic prizes highlighted the annual Honors Banquet last Friday. Jim Adler is the new Editor-in-Chief of the Law Review, and the Associate Editors are James Blanchard, Robert Jillson, Daniel Lewis, Cecil Mellin, John Peschel, and Clayton Smalley. Judd Bacon, Clarrold Britton, Robert Brooks, James Cripe, James DeVries, Louis Frey, Victor Gibbons, Paul Hanke, James Hourihan, Roger Kapp, Kenneth Laing, John Livingston, Robert McLaughlin, Allen Miller, Eldon Olson, Henry Pearsall, John Porter, Allen Price, Vastine Stabler, Robert Steed, William Thursby, William Webb, Stanley Williams, and Stanley Zax are the Assistant Editors.

The Henry M. Bates Awards to the three most outstanding seniors were won by Thomas Kauper, Barbara Burt, and Joel Simon. William Bale won the Barristers Award, Dean Berry won the Jerome S. Freud Memorial Award, and Robert Bombaugh, Barbara Burt, and Stevan Uzelac won the Clarence M. Burton Memorial Scholarships.

NEW PUBLICATION ON THE HISTORY OF THE LAW SCHOOL. A thoroughly documented history of the University of Michigan Law School has been published and will be available for the remainder of this centennial year. Legal Education at Michigan, 1859-1959 is written by Research Associate Elizabeth Gaspar Brown in consultation with Professor William Wirt Blume. Although usually sold at \$15.00, this 957 page book containing 7 illustrations is being offered to law students at a special price of \$12.00 this year.

This volume is the product of over three years of planning and effort. The Centennial Committee of the Law Faculty, with Professor Marcus Plant as chairman, determined in 1956 that a history of the Law School would be both desirable and appropriate at this particular time. The work was carried forward as part of the research program of the Law School and was financed by funds derived from the William W. Cook Endowment Income. Among the student research assistants who contributed toward the completion of this study were John Baumgartner and Thomas Hauser, members of the present senior class.

TESTIMONIAL DINNER for retiring Dean E. Blythe Stason and for Professor Hessel Yntema will be held Monday evening in the Law Club dining room. The Law Faculty will present the University of Michigan with a portrait of Dean Stason. Dean Stason will deliver a short speech and both professors will receive gifts from the Law Club.

Professor Eric Stein will be on the program of the Annual Meeting of the American Society of International Law in Washington, Friday, April 29, and he will be on the panel discussing "Regionalism and International Law: The Most-Favored-Nation Clause in a Changing World." Professor William Bishop, Jr. will be attending this meeting also.

Public Regulation of Private Discrimination Based on Race is the subject of the Broomfield essay contest, open to all students and alumni of the University of Michigan. First prize is \$700, second prize \$500, and third prize \$300. Closing date for entries is January 6, 1961, and the length must be between 9,000 and 12,000 words. Details are on the main bulletin board.

This weekend the Conference for Human Rights in the North will take place at the Student Activities Building. The Keynote Address will be given by the Rev. Martin Luther King. Negro employment opportunities, voter registration and political activity, and non-discriminatory housing are among the subjects to be discussed.

SPRING PICNIC. Sunday afternoon at 2:30 the Law Club will hold its annual Spring Picnic at Susterka Lake Park, which has facilities for softball, horseback riding, swimming, and canoeing. Refreshments will be served.

Directions to the Park are as follows. Take Route 12 east to Fifth Wheel restaurant; turn right and proceed 1-1/2 miles to a hard surface road. Turn left for one mile, the entrance is on the right.

CREASE BALL. Tomorrow night the annual Crease Ball brings together all law students who bargained the barristers out of a \$3 pants press and a subpoena for their best girl from the Ann Arbor police. The dance will be held in the Lawyers Club from 9:00 until 12:00. The law faculty has been advised by appropriate advertisements in Hutchins Hall that it is invited.
