PROFESSOR EMERITUS EDSON READ SUNDERLAND DIED SUNDAY, MARCH 29 AT HIS HOME IN ANN ARBOR. He was 84.....Nationally known for his work on civil procedure reform Professor Sunderland served on the U-M faculty 43 years prior to his retirement in 1944. A recipient of three honorary LL.D.'s, he was the author of about 20 book-size publications and of more than 130 articles in periodicals.....Funeral services were held on Wednesday, April 1, at the home.
