Pp. 19. \$1.~A brief essay in which the author traces the history of the corporation and discusses its responsibility to society.

INTERNATIONAL IMPLICATIONS OF FULL EMPLOYMENT IN GREAT BRITAIN. By *Allan G. B. Fisher*—Price Professor of International Economics, Royal Institute of International Affairs. New York: Royal Institute of International Affairs. 1947. Pp. 209. \$3.50. An analysis of Great Britain's two post war economic aims—full employment at home, and cooperation in reconstructing an "open" international system under the Mutual Aid Agreement—and the conflicts between the policy decisions that will have to be made in realizing the two aims.

OUT OF YOUR POCKET. The Story of Cartels. By *Darel McConkey*—three years a member of the staff of Special Senate Subcommittee on War Mobilization. Foreword by *Harley M. Kilgore*, Senator from West Virginia, Chairman of the Committee. New

York: Reynal & Hitchcock. Pamphlet Press. 1947. Pp. 128. Paper. \$1.~A smoothly-written, simplified story of cartels and their effect on jobs, prices and quality of goods; based on the findings of the Senate Committee on Patents, the Special Senate Committee to Investigate the National Defense Program, the Temporary National Economic Committee, the Special Subcommittee on War Mobilization, and the Department of Justice.

GERMAN LABOR COURTS. By *Frieda Wunderlich*—Ph.D. University of Freiburg; former general secretary of German branch of International Association for Social Progress; former member on Council of Berlin and in Russian Diet; author, "Labor under German Democracy" and "British Labor and the War." Chapter on Labor Courts in German Judicial System by *Ernst Fraenkel*. Chapter Hill, N.C.: Univ. of North Carolina Press. 1946. Pp. 262. \$3.50. ~Thoroughly documented presentation of the history of labor courts to 1927; an analysis of the system, 1927-1933; and an account of the changes that took place under National Socialism.

DELINQUENT GIRLS IN COURT. By *Paul W. Tappan*—member, New York bar; sociologist on the faculty of New York University and of Queens College. Foreword by *Karl N. Llewellyn*. Columbia University Press. 1947. Pp. x, 265. \$3.~A critical analysis of the Wayward Minor Court of New York City, based on statistics, interviews, intensive studies of 300 selected cases, and extensive courtroom observation. The

author discusses the institutional and legal problems of the court in the realization of its somewhat anomalous position in the administration of criminal justice, as a combination of social agency and judicial tribunal. There is an extensive bibliography.

Report to the President of the United States, June 7, 1945. II. Four-Power Agreement for Trials and Charter of International Military Tribunal. III. Opening Statement for the United States. IV. The Law Under Which Nazi Organizations Are Accused of Being Criminal, Argument by Robert H. Jackson. V. Closing Address. VI. Excerpts from Cross-Examination of Defendants. In his *Preface* the author says:

"To condense the evidence and to relate it to the doctrine of the case in a series of addresses to the Tribunal was my duty. . . . These speeches were addressed to a bench which had heard all of the evidence . . . and may sometimes assume background knowledge not possessed by the average reader. But they are not in technical terms and perhaps present as comprehensive a statement of the contentions of the prosecution as most readers will find time to study."
