1. This course, seminar, or clinic grade basis is mandatory limited grade (pass/fail) or "S" grade.
2. This course, seminar, or clinic grade basis is mandatory graded and may **not** be taken on an *elective* limited grade (pass/fail) or "P" grade. This upper class course, seminar, or clinic grade may **not** be converted from a letter grade to a "P" grade.
3. This course, seminar, or clinic fulfills the professional responsibility requirement for graduation applicable to all students.
4. This section of the course, seminar, or clinic fulfills the law upper-level writing requirement (LUWR) for JD students and the research requirement for LLM students. **EXCEPTION--Fall Starters who take the upper class course/seminar as the first-year elective do not fulfill the law upper-level writing requirement (LUWR) for JD students.**
5. This section of the course, seminar, or clinic does **not** fulfill the law upper-level writing requirement (LUWR) for JD students or the research requirement for LLM students.
6. This section is for administrative purposes only and does **not** indicate the availability of additional seats. Students may **not** enroll themselves into this section.
7. **STUDENTS ARE REQUIRED TO ATTEND THE FIRST CLASS MEETING OF THIS SEMINAR, PRACTICE/SIMULATION COURSE, OR CLINIC. This policy includes students who enrolled through the Law Course Bidding Interface (CBI) or during the Drop/Add period from the waitlist and those students not enrolled but who are interested in enrolling, whether or not they are on the waitlist. Students who fail to attend the first class meeting WITHOUT making prior arrangements with the professor for an excused absence will have their name removed from the class roster or forfeit their enrollment opportunity. IMPORTANT--IF A STUDENT DECIDES TO DROP A SEMINAR OR PRACTICE/SIMULATION COURSE, S/HE MUST DO SO WITHIN 24 HOURS AFTER THE FIRST CLASS MEETING. This will allow another waitlisted student an expedited opportunity to enroll.**
8. This clinic, seminar, or practice/simulation course **requires** students to follow **specific procedures** during the **active** registration cycle or forfeit their enrollment opportunity:
 - **Cycle ONE--Clinic Bidding**--requires students to request the clinic via the Law Course Bidding Interface (CBI). For clinic information or clinic waitlist questions, please contact the Clinic Coordinator, clinic-applications@umich.edu.
 - **Cycle TWO--Seminar and Practice/Simulation Course Bidding**--requires students to **complete TWO steps: (1)** request the seminar or practice/simulation course via the Law Course Bidding Interface (CBI) **AND (2)** follow the "time sensitive" special sign-up procedure listed in the term specific online Registration Instructions. The Registration Instructions are located on the Office of the Registrar web site, click "Registration" in the left-hand column, click "Registration Instructions" in the middle column (<http://www.law.umich.edu/currentstudents/registration/registration/Pages/default.aspx>).
9. This clinic, seminar, or practice/simulation course has been designated a "**Prof Pick**."
 - **Cycle ONE--Clinic Bidding**--during the CBI Clinic processing, admission is by permission of the professor. The professor retrieves a list of students who requested the clinic and makes selections. If possible, the clinic coordinator assigns the selected students. NOTE--CBI limits class assignment to a maximum of ONE clinic. Students assigned to the clinics are uploaded into CBI and their 15 credit maximum is reduced by the clinic credits **before** the Seminar and Practice/Simulation Course registration period begins. During the Wolverine Access Drop/Add period, admission to this clinic off the waitlist is also by permission of the professor and **not** according to waitlist order. If a seat is available, the professor makes a selection from the waitlist. The clinic coordinator contacts the curriculum coordinator who creates an individual "time sensitive" permission code and e-mails the selected student so they can enroll themselves via Wolverine Access. For clinic information or clinic waitlist questions, please contact the Clinic Coordinator, clinic-applications@umich.edu.
 - **Cycle TWO--Seminar and Practice/Simulation Course Bidding**--during the CBI Seminar and Practice/Simulation Course processing, admission is by permission of the professor. The professor retrieves a list of students who requested the class and makes selections. If possible, the curriculum coordinator assigns the selected students. NOTE--CBI limits class assignment to a maximum of ONE seminar and ONE practice/simulation course. During the Wolverine Access Drop/Add period, admission to this seminar or practice/simulation course off the waitlist is also by permission of the professor and **not** according to waitlist order. If a seat is available, the professor makes a selection from the waitlist and contacts the curriculum coordinator who creates an individual "time sensitive" permission code and e-mails the selected student so they can enroll themselves via Wolverine Access.
10. Students selected via CBI will be enrolled in both the clinic and related "seminar." Students selected and notified during the Drop/Add period **must** use Wolverine Access to enroll themselves in **both** the clinic and related seminar.
11. Students selected via CBI will be enrolled in both the clinic and related "field course." Students selected and notified during the Drop/Add period **must** use Wolverine Access to enroll themselves in **both** the clinic and related field course.
12. This course or seminar is limited in size.
13. Class will meet an average of two days per week.
14. Class will meet an average of three days per week.
15. Class will meet an average of four days per week.
16. Winter Term--First-year students (Fall Starters) may elect this two (2) credit course/seminar as the first-year elective.
17. Students **must** elect both the course and related research.
18. All students are enrolled in the upper class course exam section (001). The student must receive permission from the professor before they can request enrollment in the "paper option" section (002). **EXCEPTION--Fall Starters who take the upper class course as their first-year elective have no choice and must take the exam!** For those students who do qualify, the paper option fulfills the law upper-level writing requirement (LUWR) for JD students and the research requirement for LLM students. To request enrollment in the paper option section, please refer

to footnote #19.

19. If you have received permission from the professor and are **not** a Fall Starter enrolled in a first-year elective, you may request enrollment in the paper option section (002) by sending an e-mail to LawCurriculumCoordinator@umich.edu and make "Paper Option" the subject line. This request **must** be made no later than--mid March for the Winter Term and mid November for the Fall term--unless an earlier deadline has been established by the professor. The e-mail should contain the following information:
 - Your FULL name (no nicknames)
 - Your STUDENT ID number (listed on your U of M ID card)
 - Professor's FULL name (remember, we have many professors with the same last name and even the same first initial)
 - 3-digit course number
 - Course title
 - 5-digit class number of the section to **drop** (the section in which you are enrolled)
 - 5-digit class number of the section to **add** (the section displaying footnote #4)
 - Term in which you are making the section change
20. Both sections of this course meet simultaneously in the same classroom.
21. This "meet-together" course or seminar will include students from another department or school.
22. #900 RESEARCH, #980 ADVANCED CLINICAL LAW, and #985 ADVANCED POVERTY LAW IN A MEDICAL LEGAL COLLABORATIVE: These courses may be elected for one (1), two (2), or three (3) credit hours.
23. Winter Term--First-year students (Summer Starters) may elect this course as their foundation (bottleneck) course.
24. #799 SENIOR JUDGE SEMINAR: Students **must** be selected to be enrolled as a Senior Judge. For information, please contact Kathi Ganz (kganz@umich.edu).
25. #794 SENIOR JUDGE SEMINAR II: Students **must** complete two semesters of #799 Senior Judge Seminar to be eligible for enrollment.
26. #938 SOUTH AFRICA EXTERNSHIP and #939 SOUTH AFRICA EXTERNSHIP SEMINAR: Consult the externship descriptions available in the rack outside Room 313, Hutchins Hall, for important information about externship procedures and requirements. Students **must** be registered in both #938 South Africa Externship and #939 South Africa Externship Seminar.

31. #942 LAW PRACTICUM RESEARCH: Eligible JD students may enroll in this course for one (1), two (2), or three (3) credits. Eligible LLM/SJD students **must** enroll for either two (2) or three (3) credits.
32. #980 ADVANCED CLINICAL LAW and #985 ADVANCED POVERTY LAW IN A MEDICAL LEGAL COLLABORATIVE: Students are enrolled by invitation **only** after having expressed interest to one of the clinic faculty or administrators.

37. Winter Term--First-year students (Fall Starters) **cannot** elect this practice/simulation course, clinic, or research course.
38. Winter Term--First-year students (Summer Starters) **cannot** elect this clinic.
39. This seminar is offered for two (2) credits. However, the professor has the option of allowing students to write a longer seminar paper or do other additional work to receive an additional credit. Any student making such an arrangement with the professor **must** enroll in #800 SEMINAR SUPPLEMENT. See footnote #40. **EXCEPTION--Beginning Winter 2010, when Fall Starters elect the seminar as the first-year elective NO additional credit is allowed.**
40. #800 SEMINAR SUPPLEMENT: This is a **TWO** step registration process: **(1)** make arrangements with the professor to write a longer seminar paper or do other additional work to receive additional credit **AND (2)** refer to the Registration Instructions, Section V: 800 Seminar Supplement, for directions. **Points of Clarification: (1)** #800 SEMINAR SUPPLEMENT on its own does **not** fulfill the upper-level writing requirement **(2) whether or not to permit a student to enroll for the 800 Seminar Supplement is entirely the decision of the faculty member teaching the seminar.**
41. Laptop use during class sessions is **not** permitted!
42. A seminar listed at three (3) credits is **not eligible** for the additional #800 SEMINAR SUPPLEMENT credit.
43. The time listed for this class is PM.
44. This seminar, either because it is for only one (1) credit or at the request of the professor, is **not** eligible for the additional #800 SEMINAR SUPPLEMENT credit.

45. #947 GENEVA EXTERNSHIP and #948 GENEVA EXTERNSHIP SEMINAR: Information concerning the Geneva Externship Program is available from the Center for International and Comparative Studies, 212 Hutchins Hall. The #948 Geneva Externship Seminar does **not** fulfill the law upper-level writing requirement (LUWR) for JD students. Students **must** be registered in both #947 Geneva Externship and #948 Geneva Externship Seminar.
46. To choose the three (3) credit section of this seminar which fulfills the upper-level writing requirement students **must** complete **TWO** steps: **(1)** seek the professor's permission to switch seminar sections **AND (2)** request enrollment in the three credit ULWR section of the seminar by sending an e-mail to LawCurriculumCoordinator@umich.edu and make "Three Credit ULWR Section" the subject line. This request **must** be made no later than--mid March for the Winter Term and mid November for the Fall term--unless an earlier deadline has been established by the professor. 47. This clinic is a year-long commitment so students enrolled for the fall term will **automatically** be enrolled for the winter term. No additional students will be added during the winter term.
48. Once enrolled in a clinic, the expectation is the student will remain in the clinic so client assignments can be made. However, a student who needs to drop the clinic **must** email the professor and request a drop with a brief explanation of the reason for it. A student who drops a first or second choice clinic may reduce their chances of acceptance into a clinic in future semesters!
49. Students are required to attend the first class meeting of the #990 Part-time Externship/#991 Part-time Externship Seminar. Students who fail to attend the first class meeting without making prior arrangements with the professor for an excused absence will have their name removed from the class roster.
50. Students do **not** bid for the #990 Part-time Externship/#991 Part-time Externship Seminar using the CBI system. Instead, a student seeking to enroll in the class must submit a resume and a short statement of interest to Professor Sankaran (aharwell@umich.edu) as early as the beginning of the CBI registration period and no later than May 1 for the fall semester and December 1 for the winter semester. The statement must include:
- 1) Name of placement or proposed placement;
 - 2) How the proposed placement furthers his or her academic and professional goals;
 - 3) A description of the work the student will be doing at his or her placement;
 - 4) If the placement is already secured, a) name, phone number, and email of supervisor or other appropriate contact, and b) work schedule; and,
 - 5) If the placement is not yet secured, what steps the student will take to secure the placement.
- Permission to enroll in this class is granted exclusively by Professor Sankaran during the weeks prior to the semester in which the externship will take place. Students must have their placements finalized no later than one week prior to the first day of the semester.
- Students may **not** take #990 Part-time Externship/#991 Part-time Externship Seminar and be enrolled in a clinic during the same semester.
51. #635 CORPORATE FINANCE and #650 CORPORATE FINANCE TUTORIAL: Because Law 635 and Law 650 are so closely related, when both classes are offered in the same term, these two classes are treated as a single class for purposes of converting a letter grade to a "Pass." This does not obligate any student to convert a letter grade to a P in both classes. Rather, students may exercise conversion option for neither, one or both classes.
52. #606 TRANSNATIONAL LAW: Students who enrolled at the Law School during Spring/Summer 2011 or later **must** take Law 606 during their third or fourth term.
