1. This course, seminar, or clinic grade basis is mandatory limited grade (pass/fail) or "S" grade.
2. This course, seminar, or clinic grade basis is mandatory graded; the grade received may **not** be converted from a letter grade to a "P" grade.
3. This course, seminar, or clinic fulfills the professional responsibility requirement for graduation applicable to all students.
4. This section of the course, seminar, or clinic fulfills the law upper-level writing requirement (LUWR) for JD students and the research requirement for LLM students. **EXCEPTION—Fall Starters who take the upper class course/seminar as the first-year elective do not fulfill the law upper-level writing requirement (LUWR) for JD students.**
5. This section of the course, seminar, or clinic does **not** fulfill the law upper-level writing requirement (LUWR) for JD students or the research requirement for LLM students.
6. While this clinic fulfills the Law School's professional responsibility requirement for graduation, it does **not**, however, fulfill the New York State Bar ethics requirement unless students also simultaneously enroll in 402 Ethics Colloquium section 002 (which is not offered in the Winter 2015 term).
7. **STUDENTS ARE REQUIRED TO ATTEND THE FIRST CLASS MEETING OF THIS SEMINAR, PRACTICE/SIMULATION COURSE, OR CLINIC. This policy includes students who enrolled through the Law Course Bidding Interface (CBI) or during the Drop/Add period from the waitlist and those students not enrolled but who are interested in enrolling, whether or not they are on the waitlist. Students who fail to attend the first class meeting WITHOUT making prior arrangements with the professor for an excused absence will have their name removed from the class roster or forfeit their enrollment opportunity. IMPORTANT—IF A STUDENT DECIDES TO DROP A SEMINAR OR PRACTICE/SIMULATION COURSE, S/HE MUST DO SO WITHIN 24 HOURS AFTER THE FIRST CLASS MEETING. This will allow another waitlisted student an expedited opportunity to enroll.**

8. This clinic, seminar, or practice/simulation course **requires** students to follow **specific procedures** or forfeit their enrollment opportunity during the **active** registration cycle.

If the class to which this footnote is attached is a CLINIC:

- **During active CBI Cycle ONE--Clinic Bidding**--Students are required to request the clinic via the Law Course Bidding Interface (CBI) and submit in CBI all applicable supplemental material (e.g., application and resume). If the class to which this footnote is attached is a SEMINAR or PRACTICE/SIMULATION COURSE (**not** including clinic seminar components):

- **During active CBI Cycle TWO--Seminar and Practice/Simulation Course Bidding**--Students are required to **complete TWO steps: (1)** request the seminar or practice/simulation course via the Law Course Bidding Interface (CBI) **AND (2)** follow the "time sensitive" special sign-up procedure listed in the term-specific online Registration Instructions. The Registration Instructions are located on the Law School "Office of Student Records" Web site, under "Registration" (<http://www.law.umich.edu/currentstudents/registration/registration/Pages/Registration%20Information.aspx>).

9. This clinic, seminar, or practice/simulation course has been designated a "prof pick."

If the class to which this footnote is attached is a CLINIC:

- **CBI Cycle ONE--Clinic Bidding**--During the CBI Clinic processing, admission is by permission of the professor. The professor retrieves a list of students who requested the clinic and makes selections. If possible, the clinic coordinator assigns the selected students. NOTE--CBI limits clinic assignment to a maximum of ONE clinic.
- **Drop/Add Period**--During the Wolverine Access Drop/Add period, admission to this clinic off the waitlist is by permission of the professor and **not** according to waitlist order. If a seat is available, the professor makes a selection from the waitlist. The clinic coordinator contacts the curriculum coordinator who creates an individual "time sensitive" permission code and e-mails the selected student so they can enroll themselves via Wolverine Access. If the class to which this footnote is attached is a SEMINAR or PRACTICE/SIMULATION COURSE:

- **CBI Cycle TWO--Seminar and Practice/Simulation Course Bidding**--During the CBI Seminar and Practice/Simulation Course processing, admission is by permission of the professor. The professor retrieves a list of students who requested the class and makes selections. If possible, the curriculum coordinator assigns the selected students. NOTE--CBI limits class assignment to a maximum of ONE seminar and ONE practice/simulation course.
- **Drop/Add Period**--During the Wolverine Access Drop/Add period, admission to this seminar or practice/simulation course off the waitlist is by permission of the professor and **not** according to waitlist order. If a seat is available, the professor makes a selection from the waitlist and contacts the curriculum coordinator who creates an individual "time sensitive" permission code and e-mails the selected student so they can enroll themselves via Wolverine Access. To be considered for an open seat during the Drop/Add period, place your name on the waitlist in Wolverine Access and **send a statement of interest to the e-mail address indicated in the term-specific online Registration Instructions.** The Registration Instructions are located on the Law School "Office of Student Records" Web site, under "Registration" (<http://www.law.umich.edu/currentstudents/registration/registration/Pages/Registration%20Information.aspx>). Any special instructions from the professor regarding the content of the statement of interest required for this class will be listed in the term-specific online Registration Instructions.

10. Students selected via CBI will be enrolled in both the clinic and related "seminar." Students selected and notified during the Drop/Add period **must** use Wolverine Access to enroll themselves in **both** the clinic and related seminar.
11. Students selected via CBI will be enrolled in both the clinic and related "field course." Students selected and notified during the Drop/Add period **must** use Wolverine Access to enroll themselves in **both** the clinic and related field course.
12. This course or seminar is limited in size.

13. Class will meet an average of two days per week.
14. Class will meet an average of three days per week.
15. Class will meet an average of four days per week.
16. Winter Term--First-year students (Fall Starters) may elect this two (2) credit course/seminar as the first-year elective.
17. Students **must** elect both the course and related research.
18. All students are enrolled in the upper class course exam section (001). The student **must** receive permission from the professor **before** they can request enrollment in the "paper option" section (002). **EXCEPTION--Fall Starters who take the upper class course as their first-year elective have no choice and must take the exam!** For those students who do qualify, the paper option fulfills the law upper-level writing requirement (LUWR) for JD students and the research requirement for LLM students. To request enrollment in the paper option section, please refer to footnote #19.
19. If you have received permission from the professor and are **not** a Fall Starter enrolled in a first-year elective, you may request enrollment in the paper option section (002) by sending an e-mail to LawCurriculumCoordinator@umich.edu and make "Paper Option" the subject line. This request **must** be made no later than--**mid March for the Winter Term and mid November for the Fall term**--unless an earlier deadline has been established by the professor. The e-mail should contain the following information:
 - Your FULL name (no nicknames)
 - Your STUDENT ID number (listed on your U of M ID card)
 - Professor's FULL name (remember, we have many professors with the same last name and even the same first initial)
 - 3-digit course number
 - Course title
 - 5-digit class number of the section to **drop** (the section in which you are enrolled)
 - 5-digit class number of the section to **add** (the section displaying footnote #4)
 - Term in which you are making the section change
20. Both sections of this course meet simultaneously in the same classroom.
21. This "meet-together" course or seminar will include students from another department or school.
22. #900 RESEARCH, #980 ADVANCED CLINICAL LAW, and #992 RESEARCH: SPECIAL PROJECTS: These courses may be elected for one (1), two (2), or three (3) credit hours.
23. Winter Term--First-year students (Summer Starters) may elect this course as their foundation (bottleneck) course.
24. #799 SENIOR JUDGE SEMINAR: Students **must** be selected to be enrolled as a Senior Judge. For information, please contact Kathi Ganz (kganz@umich.edu).
25. #794 SENIOR JUDGE SEMINAR II: Students **must** complete two semesters of #799 Senior Judge Seminar to be eligible for enrollment.
26. #938 SOUTH AFRICA EXTERNSHIP and #939 SOUTH AFRICA EXTERNSHIP SEMINAR: Consult <http://www.law.umich.edu/curriculum/externshipsandindependentstudy/southafrica/Pages/default.aspx> for important information about the application process and requirements. Students **must** be registered in both #938 South Africa Externship and #939 South Africa Externship Seminar.

Students **must** be registered in both #945 Semester Study Abroad and #946 Semester Study Abroad Paper.
29. #900 RESEARCH and #992 RESEARCH: SPECIAL PROJECTS: This is a **TWO** step registration process: **(1)** make arrangements with a professor to do an independent study **AND (2)** refer to the online Registration Instructions, Section III: 900 & 992 Research, for directions. 31. #942 LAW PRACTICUM RESEARCH: Eligible JD students may enroll in this course for one (1), two (2), or three (3) credits. Eligible LLM/SJD students **must** enroll for either two (2) or three (3) credits.
32. #980 ADVANCED CLINICAL LAW, #973 FEDERAL APPELLATE LITIGATION CLINIC II, #975 UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE CLINIC II, and #729 ZEAL VENTURE CAPITAL LAB: Students are enrolled by invitation **only** after having expressed interest to one of the clinic faculty or administrators.

34. LLM students are **not** eligible to elect this course.
35. Winter Term--First-year students (Fall Starters) **cannot** elect this course or seminar as the first-year elective.
36. LLM students are **not** eligible to elect this clinic unless they previously earned a JD degree from an American Bar Association (ABA) approved law school in the U.S.
37. Winter Term--First-year students (Fall Starters) **cannot** elect this practice/simulation course, clinic, research course, or mini-seminar.
38. Winter Term--First-year students (Summer Starters) **cannot** elect this course section or clinic.

39. This seminar is offered for two (2) credits. However, the professor has the option of allowing students to write a longer seminar paper or do other additional work to receive an additional credit. Any student making such an arrangement with the professor **must** enroll in #800 SEMINAR SUPPLEMENT. See footnote #40 (attached to Law 800 Seminar Supplement on the class schedule). **EXCEPTION—Beginning Winter 2010, when Fall Starters elect the seminar as the first-year elective NO additional credit is allowed.**
40. #800 SEMINAR SUPPLEMENT: This is a **TWO** step registration process: **(1)** make arrangements with the professor to write a longer seminar paper or do other additional work to receive additional credit **AND (2)** refer to the Registration Instructions, Section V: 800 Seminar Supplement, for directions on how to register. A Quick Link to the 800 Seminar Supplement registration instructions is available at the "Registration" link on the Law School Student Records Office Web site. **Points of Clarification: (1)** #800 SEMINAR SUPPLEMENT on its own does **not** fulfill the upper-level writing requirement **(2) whether or not to permit a student to enroll for the 800 Seminar Supplement is entirely the decision of the faculty member teaching the seminar.** **(3) GRADING:** The #800 SEMINAR SUPPLEMENT grade is **not** necessarily the same as the seminar grade.
41. Laptop use during class sessions is **not** permitted!
42. A seminar listed at three (3) credits is **not eligible** for the additional #800 SEMINAR SUPPLEMENT credit.
43. The time listed for this class is PM.
44. This seminar, either because it is for only one (1) credit or at the request of the professor, is **not** eligible for the additional #800 SEMINAR SUPPLEMENT credit.
45. #947 GENEVA EXTERNSHIP and #948 GENEVA EXTERNSHIP SEMINAR: Information concerning the Geneva Externship Program is available from the Center for International and Comparative Studies, 212 Hutchins Hall. The #948 Geneva Externship Seminar does **not** fulfill the law upper-level writing requirement (LUWR) for JD students. Students **must** be registered in both #947 Geneva Externship and #948 Geneva Externship Seminar.
46. To choose the three (3) credit section of this seminar which fulfills the upper-level writing requirement students **must** complete **TWO** steps: **(1)** seek the professor's permission to switch seminar sections **AND (2)** request enrollment in the three credit ULWR section of the seminar by sending an e-mail to LawCurriculumCoordinator@umich.edu and make "Three Credit ULWR Section" the subject line. This request **must** be made no later than--mid March for the Winter Term and mid November for the Fall term--unless an earlier deadline has been established by the professor. The e-mail should contain the following information:

47. This clinic is a year-long commitment so students enrolled for the fall term will **automatically** be enrolled for the winter term. No additional students will be added during the winter term.
48. Once enrolled in a clinic, the expectation is the student will remain in the clinic so client assignments can be made. However, a student who needs to drop the clinic **must** email the professor and request a drop with a brief explanation of the reason for it. A student who drops a first or second choice clinic may reduce their chances of acceptance into a clinic in future semesters!
49. Students are required to attend the first class meeting of the #990 Part-time Externship/#991 Part-time Externship Seminar. Students who fail to attend the first class meeting without making prior arrangements with the professor for an excused absence will have their name removed from the class roster.
50. Students do **not** bid for the #990 Part-time Externship/#991 Part-time Externship Seminar using the CBI system. - Students do not have to have a placement secured to apply; they may apply by listing proposed placements in the application and submit the required Memorandum of Understanding once the placement is finalized.
- Students must apply no later than December 1 for a Winter externship and May 1 for a Fall externship.
- Permission to enroll in this class is granted exclusively by Professor Sankaran during the weeks prior to the semester in which the externship will take place. Students must have their placements finalized no later than one week prior to the first day of the semester.
- Students may **not** take #990 Part-time Externship/#991 Part-time Externship Seminar and be enrolled in a 7-credit clinic during the same semester.
51. #635 CORPORATE FINANCE and #650 CORPORATE FINANCE TUTORIAL: Because Law 635 and Law 650 are so closely related, when both classes are offered in the same term, these two classes are treated as a single class for purposes of converting a letter grade to a "Pass." This does not obligate any student to convert a letter grade to a P in both classes. Rather, students may exercise conversion option for neither, one or both classes.
52. #606 TRANSNATIONAL LAW: Students who enrolled at the Law School during Spring/Summer 2011 or later **must** take Law 606 during their third or fourth term.
53. #402/002 ETHICS COLLOQUIUM, #723 CORPORATE LAWYER: LAW & ETHICS, #731 LEGAL ETHICS AND PROFESSIONAL RESPONSIBILITY, and #797 MODEL RULES AND BEYOND: Any student who matriculated as a first-year student in May 2012 or thereafter who wishes to be eligible to apply for membership to the New York bar **must** take either Law 402/002 (Ethics Colloquium section 002), Law 723 (Corporate Lawyer: Law & Ethics), Law 731 (Legal Ethics and Professional Responsibility) or Law 797 (Model Rules and Beyond).
54. This section of the course fulfills the New York bar's ethics requirement.
55. This section of the course does **not** fulfill the New York bar's ethics requirement.
56. #540 INTRODUCTION TO CONSTITUTIONAL LAW: Students who enrolled at the Law School during Spring/Summer 2013 or later **must** take Introduction to Constitutional Law during their third or fourth term.

57. This clinic does **not** fulfill the Law School's professional responsibility requirement for graduation. This clinic does **not** fulfill the New York State Bar ethics requirement unless students also simultaneously enroll in 402 Ethics Colloquium section 002.
58. #542 INTRODUCTION TO CONSTITUTIONAL LAW 2: #541 Intro to Constitutional Law 1 is a pre-requisite.
59. This is a distance education course. Accreditation rules limit JD students to a maximum of 15 distance education credits during their law school career. Additionally, a JD student is not eligible to enroll in a distance education course until after he or she has completed 28 credits.
60. Fall Term--#665 INTRODUCTION TO US TAX LAW: This course is open **only** to foreign graduate tax students (Tax LLM).
61. Students who took #823 WOMEN AND WAR may **not** elect #823 GENDER AND CONFLICT IN INTERNATIONAL LAW or vice versa.
62. #991 PART-TIME EXTERNSHIP SEMINAR: This class will meet nine times during the semester, specific dates **TBA**.
63. Fall Term--#631 INTRODUCTION TO AMERICAN CONSTITUTIONAL LAW AND AMERICAN LEGAL PROCESS: This course is open **only** to foreign graduate students (LLM).
64. Fall Term--#696 RESEARCH AND ANALYSIS IN AMERICAN LAW: This course is open **only** to foreign graduate students (LLM) pursuant to the Academic Regulations for the M.C.L. and LL.M. degrees. Students may elect this course for either one (1) or two (2) credits:
 - One (1) credit option -- students will meet for seven consecutive weeks beginning the first week of the term.
 - Two (2) credit option -- students will meet for the entire term beginning the first week of the term.
65. #608 ADVANCED LEGAL RESEARCH: #590 Legal Practice I and #591 Legal Practice II are pre-requisites.
66. #608 ADVANCED LEGAL RESEARCH: Students may earn three (3) credits for the practice/simulation course--two (2) credits for the class and one (1) credit for #900 Research--by making arrangements with the professor(s) to write a longer research paper **AND** enrolling in #900 Research. A Quick Link to the #900 Research registration instructions is available at the "Registration" link on the Law School Student Records Office Web site.
67. Students who have taken #645 CRIMINAL PROCEDURE SURVEY may **not** elect either #641 CRIMINAL JUSTICE: ADMINISTRATION OF POLICE PRACTICES or #641 CRIMINAL JUSTICE: INVESTIGATION & POLICE PRACTICES or #643 CRIMINAL PROCEDURE: BAIL TO POST CONVICTION REVIEW or vice versa.
68. Students who have taken #692 INTERNATIONAL LAW, #692 INTERNATIONAL LAW: U.S. FOREIGN RELATIONS LAW, and #744 INTERNATIONAL LAW: INTERNATIONAL HUMAN RIGHTS, all of which are no longer being offered, may **not** elect #606 TRANSNATIONAL LAW. #606 TRANSNATIONAL LAW is the foundational course in the international and comparative law curriculum. Students who elect #606 TRANSNATIONAL LAW may also elect any other international and comparative law course.
69. Students who took #818 HATRED AND SELF-HATRED may **not** elect #818 FAKING IT or vice versa.
70. Students who took #731 LEGAL ETHICS AND PROFESSIONAL RESPONSIBILITY may **not** elect #797 MODEL RULES AND BEYOND or vice versa.
71. Students who took #642 JEWISH LAW may **not** elect #642 TALMUDIC LAW or vice versa.
72. Students who have taken #623 COMMERCIAL TRANSACTIONS may **not** elect #652 SECURED TRANSACTIONS.
73. Students who took #738 REMEDIES may **not** elect #738 INJUNCTIONS AND EQUITABLE REMEDIES or vice versa.
74. #936 INTERNATIONAL TAXPAYER CLINIC and #937 INTERNATIONAL TAXPAYER CLINIC FIELD: #747 Taxation of Individual Income is a pre-requisite.
75. Students who have taken #470 ADVANCED IP PRACTICE are **not** eligible to take #470 INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY PRACTICE.
76. #964 CIVIL MEDIATION CLINIC and #965 CIVIL MEDIATION CLINIC SEMINAR: Students enrolled in this clinic are required to attend the Institute of Continuing Legal Education's (ICLE) Mediation Training on Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, February 12-14 **and** Friday-Saturday, March 6-7 in Plymouth, Michigan. The training will be all day each day for a total of 5 days. Attendance at all of these 5 days is **mandatory** for the clinic.
77. Students who took #517 ANTI-DISCRIMINATION LAW may **not** elect #446 ANTI-DISCRIMINATION LAW or vice versa.
78. Students who took #679 ENVIRONMENTAL LAW may **not** elect #679 ENVIRONMENTAL LAW AND POLICY or vice versa.
79. Students who took #869 LAW AND THE ELDERLY may **not** elect #869 LEGAL CHALLENGES FOR AN AGING POPULATION: LAW, POLICY, AND ETHICS or vice versa.
80. Students who took #684 HEALTH LAW may **not** elect #684 HEALTH LAW AND POLICY or vice versa.
81. Students who took #409 FEDERAL INVESTIGATION AND PROSECUTION may **not** elect #429 FEDERAL INVESTIGATION AND PROSECUTION PRACTICUM or vice versa.
82. Students who took #404 SUPREME COURT THEORY AND PRACTICE may **not** elect #430 FUNDAMENTALS OF APPELLATE PRACTICE or vice versa.
83. **#966 TRANSACTIONAL LAB: Students must have taken either Law 595 Transactional Contracts or Law 433 Transactional Drafting to be eligible for Law 966.**
84. Not used this term
85. Students who took #605 ADVANCED TRANSNATIONAL LAW or #899 THE LAW OF WAR with Professor Ratner or #622 INTERNATIONAL HUMANITARIAN LAW with Professor Kritsotis may **not** elect #857 INTERNATIONAL LAW AND TERRORISM or vice versa.
86. Students who took #519 INTERNATIONAL ORGANIZATIONS may **not** elect #519 UN AND OTHER INTERNATIONAL ORGANIZATIONS or vice versa.

87. Students who took #506 CREATIVITY AND THE LAW may **not** elect #506 COGNITIVE SCIENCE AND LEGAL REASONING or vice versa.
88. #601 ADMINISTRATIVE LAW: #569 LEGISLATION AND REGULATION is a pre-requisite for this section of Administrative Law. (Other sections of Administrative Law are designed for students who have not had Legislation and Regulation.) Professor Bagley (nbagley@umich.edu) may, at his discretion, waive this pre-requisite for students who have other background in or experience with the foundational administrative law issues covered in #569.
89. #693 JURISDICTION AND CHOICE OF LAW **AND** #537 PERSONAL AND SUBJECT MATTER JURISDICTION: These two classes are mutually exclusive. In other words, students who have taken one of these courses may **not** take the other.
90. Students who took #780 PROTECTION OF HUMAN RIGHTS IN INTERNATIONAL LAW may **not** elect #780 HUMAN RIGHTS: THEMES AND VARIATIONS or vice versa.
91. #967 DOMESTIC RELATIONS MEDIATION CLINIC and #968 DOMESTIC RELATIONS MEDIATION SEMINAR: Students enrolled in this clinic are required to attend Divorce Mediation Training in Ann Arbor, Michigan on Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, January 23-25 **and** Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, January 30-31 and February 1. The training will be all day each day for a total of 6 days. Attendance at all of these 6 days is **mandatory** for the clinic. Also, students need to be available every Thursday from 1:30 PM to 5:00 PM for mediations at Washtenaw County Circuit Court.
92. Students who took #707 MASS MEDIA LAW may **not** elect #474 PROBLEMS IN MEDIA LAW or vice versa.
93. Students who have taken #846 NONPROFIT LAW & POLICY seminar may **not** take #589 NONPROFIT LAW & POLICY upper class course or vice versa.
94. Students who have taken #644 INTRODUCTION TO INCOME TAX OF BUSINESS may **not** elect #747 TAXATION OF INDIVIDUAL INCOME unless they get permission from the professor to do so.
95. Students who have taken #673 FAMILY LAW with either Professors Steve Sanders or Mae Kuykendall may **not** elect #673 FAMILY LAW with Professor Joseph Aviv or vice versa.
